

Context	of School					
Tanfield Lea Community Primary is an average sized primary school situated on the fringe of Stanley in the north of County Durham. Stanley is typical of the former industrial towns and villages of the area, most of which have been economically depressed for many years. Despite this the area benefits from well-established and reasonably stable community identity. Our school caters for 329 children aged 3-11 years, most of whom are drawn from a white, mono cultural population. FSM eligibility is above national average (2017 - School 26% / National (2016) is 14.3%). The % of children on the SEN register is broadly in line with the national. However, the % of children requiring a support plan or Educational Health Care Plan is above the national average. Although the school deprivation indicator is at national average, the majority of our children live in the Tanfield Ward which has a low % of adults who have been in higher education and there are pockets of deprivation. Attendance is currently 95.81% (2017-18).

Our key objective in using the Pupil Premium is to narrow the gap between pupil groups. As a school we have a good track record of ensuring that pupils make good progress and have been successful in bridging the gap in attainment between PP pupils and non-PP.In order to allocate the funding to give maximum impact we use internal and external data to analyse where the gaps are and use a combination of intervention strategies as appropriate.For each item, we consider what impact we aim to have in order to achieve the objective stated above.
